> Prior to Departure

• Be sure to check your airline to see the specific **size and weight limit** for your trip.

> Day of Departure

- Have your **printed** Emergency Travel Contact Sheet and 2 copies of your Passport
- Check in at least **2.5 hours** before your flight
- **Do NOT check in online prior to your departure**
- o Bring cash or a credit or prepaid debit card
- Bring spending money for food or snacks in the airport(s)
- Our staff will be waiting for you in the arrivals outside of the airport. Look out for the **Squads Abroad sign!**

Money And Communications

The currency in Panama is the Balboa. The current conversion between the US Dollar and the Balboa is \$1 = 1PAB; \$10 = 10PAB; and \$20 = 20PAB. The US Dollar has been legally circulating in Panama since 1904 and can be used interchangeably with the Balboa.

The easiest way to access money are through the ATMs. There is an ATM within walking distance to the home-base so we suggest to withdraw money at the nearby ATM instead of doing so in the airport. If you're not able to bring a debit or credit card to withdraw money you may want to bring cash to exchange at the bank during weekday business hours.

Be sure to contact your bank and/or credit card company and let them know you are traveling abroad!



There is limited Wi-Fi at the home base. Please keep in mind that you are traveling outside of the USA and the Wifi may not be as reliable. Volunteers see this as a good opportunity to "unplug". The staff in Panama is available for you 24/7 if needed. We recommend using WhatsApp for communication back home. Your families can stay connected via the Facebook group for your program! Code of Conduct for Participants Under 18

Individuals participating in a Squads Abroad program as a part of a chaperoned group are expected to be respectful of other program participants, the program staff, the placement, and the community. Students in our program are representatives not only of themselves, but also Squads and act as ambassadors to their home country. The Squad program includes policies, rules, and regulations to ensure the safety of all participants. In the event of unacceptable behavior or a violation of any of these rules and policies, Squads will terminate your participation, and you will be asked to leave the program. Your parent or guardian will be responsible for any costs incurred due to a change in your ticket.

Program Policies

Drugs

The use of drugs is illegal. Anyone who is found asking for, buying, in possession of, or using drugs will be expelled from the program and may be reported to local authorities. Keep in mind that your country's embassy will not be able to protect you if you are in custody of the local authorities.

Alcohol and Tobacco

Volunteers are prohibited from consuming alcohol and/or tobacco while participating on a Squad program. In the United States, the legal age to purchase tobacco is 18 and alcohol is 21. Therefore, there is a no-tolerance policy for the consumption and possession of alcohol and/or tobacco while participating in a Squad program.

Weapons

Under no circumstances will staff or volunteers carry weapons or have weapons or ammunition while with CCS. To do so would undermine our humanitarian philosophy and endanger the well-being of our staff and volunteers. We adopt a no weapons policy, prohibiting weapons on CCS/Squad/GB property and vehicles.

Home-Base Policies

Curfew

All volunteers participating in the program will be expected to respect the mandatory curfew of 9pm daily. Exceptions to this curfew will only include excursions or evening activities arranged by our staff.

Quiet Hours and Lights Out

All volunteers participating in the program will be expected to respect their fellow volunteers by observing quiet hours at 10pm each night and lights out by 11pm. This will ensure volunteers are well-rested for their volunteer placement in the morning.

Prescription Medication

In order to maintain the highest level of safety, all prescription pain medication and mood-altering medication will be held by the Squad in-country staff. Once you arrive in-country please check your medications in with the Program Director and communicate the frequency/quantity you will require. When you need to take your medication, please see the Program Director or another supervising staff member to access your medication.

Sexual Relations

Volunteers are prohibited from any sexual relations while on the program.

Rooms

Volunteers are assigned to bedrooms based on gender. Volunteers are allowed access to their bedroom only. At no time should volunteers be accessing rooms to which they are not assigned. Common areas are available for socializing.

Photography and Social Media Policies

Squads Abroad asks that as a volunteer, you:

- Always consider the values of *Respect*, *Integrity*, and *Shared Humanity* before taking or sharing any photos or videos publically
- Be respectful and comply with the placement's policies toward photography
- Wait until the end of your program to bring your camera to your placement, so as to not disrupt or distract the people with whom you are working
- Agree that photos taken at your placement are to be used solely for personal use, and not for commercial or professional gain
- Do not use your phone for activities outside of photography when at the volunteer site or during cultural activities.

At Your Placement

- It is only appropriate to take your camera/phone if your camera towards the end of your program once you have developed relationships at your placement, and with the permission of the Country Director.
- When taking photos at your placement, please be respectful and do not to disrupt activities.

In The Community

- Always ask permission and respect people's wishes before taking any photos.
- Be discreet when carrying your camera keep in mind that you are traveling through another country and working in communities where expensive photographic equipment can attract undesirable attention. Don't be conspicuous about your equipment and always play it on the safe side.

Please keep in mind that photography of certain local people and vulnerable communities are a highly sensitive issue and it is the responsibility of Squads Abroad to ensure that any photos of this nature are **limited** and **protected** in **social media**!

Panama Packing List

If you're reading this list, you're likely getting much closer to your international volunteer experience with Squads Abroad! We're excited to welcome you on our program! We understand that packing can get a little stressful, but we hope that this easy-to-follow checklist will make it a little easier and a little more organized. Here are some tips to get you started:

- ✓ **Prepare for warm weather!** Average temperatures in the Coclé region will be in the 90's during the day and 70's at night so pack accordingly! Also expect scattered rain showers during the day.
- ✓ Pack light! You might find a lot of items that you'll want to bring home from your travels, so save some room.

 And who wants to be struggling through airports with heavy suitcases? Less really is more for the global traveler. You can even coordinate with fellow classmates with packing items such as sharing toiletries!
- ✓ This is your tool, not the rule. You're unique, so let your individuality shine! Just make sure your clothing is appropriate for a more conservative culture so leave your short shorts or t-shirts with questionable slogans at home.
- ✓ Historical climate data for Coclé:
 - ✓ On average, the temperatures are always high.
 - ✓ A lot of rain (rainy season) falls in the months of: May, June, July, August, September and October.
 - ✓ Coclé has dry periods in January, February and March.
 - ✓ On average, the warmest month is April.
 - ✓ On average, the coolest month is October.
 - ✓ November is the wettest month. This month should be avoided if you don't like too much rain.
 - ✓ February is the driest month.

The Basics – Clothing

This packing list below represents the estimated the amount of clothing that you can bring based on a 1-week experience so adjust accordingly for the length of your stay. Some of these are just our suggestions, so please pack what will be comfortable for you, while keeping in mind modesty in the community.

6-7 pairs of socks
7-8 pairs undergarments
1 pairs of pants or jeans (without rips or tears)
1-2 changes of sleepwear (long pants or conservative shorts with t-shirts or tank tops)
6-7 t-shirts (bring some that you don't mind getting dirty or painted on!)
One nicer outfit (like a casual dress or button-down shirt), just in case – no jewelry/heels needed
1-2 sport/active wear (like yoga pants) for playing sports & hikes
4-5 pairs of shorts (remember shorts have to come down to your knees at the work assignment)
2 Swimsuits – some weekend activities might include water! (remember – don't get too skimpy)
Hat – to protect your face from the sun when you're outdoors
Light rain jacket or poncho
Belt (if needed)
Comfortable Walking Shoes (if these aren't your tennis shoes, throw in a pair of these as well for the
occasional soccer game)
Sandals (we like the kind with back straps)
Flip-Flops for easy slip-ons after a shower or free time in the Home-Base

Cultural Do's and Don'ts

Entering a new culture is an exciting and challenging experience. Just as you bring your own culture to share, it's important to be open and respectful to the cultures of those you'll meet during your travels. You'll often find that you have a much more positive experience if you are aware of and take into account cultural norms when exploring new cultures.

Do's

- Keep your language neutral and positive at all times
- Be culturally sensitive about physical space at all times
 - o Panamanians, in general, greet each other with a handshake, a cheek-kiss or a hug
 - Personal space rarely exists and communication is very direct and involves non-verbal cues
- Smile, chat, and make others feel comfortable
- Always wear closed-toe shoes at your volunteer assignment
- Wear sunscreen and bug spray
- Be patient and flexible with any changes in our plans or unexpected delays
- Always ask permission if taking photos of people in your free time
- Have fun!

Don'ts

- Do not leave purses or bags unattended
- Never make promises of aid, monetary or otherwise
- Do not drink the tap water; clean drinking water will always be available to you and you should bring a water bottle to refill
- Do not wear anything revealing to the volunteer assignment; the communities where we work
 may be more conservative than you are used to with respect to clothing and
 interpersonal interaction
